
Overnight installation of monitoring devices near Queen Street West and Yonge Street

Expected Start Date: As early as October 11, 2023 **Expected End Date:** Up to November 30, 2023

Planned work hours: Weekdays overnight from 9 p.m. to 5 a.m.

What is happening?

- In preparation for construction activities at the future Queen Station, crews will be installing monitoring devices along Yonge Street in the areas noted above on the map.
- Monitoring devices are installed to investigate and track underground work.
- The work will be completed in four phases to minimize traffic impacts in the neighbourhood.

What to expect

- Northbound and southbound lanes along Yonge Street will be closed intermittently and vehicle traffic will be rerouted around work zones, using traffic barrels.
- Work will require intermittent closures of the north and south pedestrian cross walk at Queen Street and Yonge Street, as well as the sidewalk on the west side of Yonge Street.

- During southbound lane work, sections of the west sidewalk on Yonge Street and the north crosswalk at the Queen and Yonge intersection will be closed. Pedestrians will need to cross to the east sidewalk if travelling on Yonge Street.
- During northbound lane work, the north crosswalk at the Queen and Yonge intersection will be closed.
- There will be additional sidewalk impacts during some southbound lane work. Sections of
 the west sidewalk on Yonge Street and the south crosswalk at the Queen and Yonge
 intersection will be closed. Pedestrians will be required to cross to the east sidewalk on
 Yonge Street.
- Equipment such as a saw cutter and a hydrovac truck will be used.
- Noise will be generated from work equipment.
- Construction work is coordinated with other contractors in the area to help reduce impacts.
- Clear signage will be posted to caution and direct drivers, cyclists, and pedestrians.
- All the necessary construction permits have been obtained.
- Work may be postponed or rescheduled due to unforeseen weather conditions or other construction-related impacts.

About the Ontario Line
