## What is piling?

- Crews will be drilling to install structural walls also known as secant pile walls - to support the underground excavation of the Ontario Line station at Queen Street West and Spadina Avenue.
- A secant pile wall is a type of retaining wall used to secure the soil and ensure water tightness prior to excavation.
- The process consists of drilling a series of holes and filling them with concrete to create overlapping (secant) piles that form a continuous structural wall.
- Some of the piles are further reinforced with steel beams.
- This work is performed prior to excavation to prevent ground settlement.
- Work will begin first on the future south station site, before moving to the future north station site.

#### What to expect

- Work is expected to take place weekdays between 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.
- Noise from equipment drilling piles, removing spoils and concrete work is expected.
- Residents will see drilling machines, cranes, excavators, concrete pumps, and concrete trucks on-site during this phase of work.
- Several trucks will be entering and leaving worksites daily, following a specified route.
- Work will be phased, beginning first at the future south site, followed by the north site.
- Lane closures will be in place to ensure safety for the community and workers on-site and will remain in place for the duration of the work period.
- To reduce impacts to residents and businesses in the area, mitigations will be in place including noise and vibration monitoring, daytime work hours and site hoarding.
- Work may be postponed or rescheduled due to unforeseen circumstances.





# Pedestrian Access and Truck Routing at the South Site (Queen Street West, Graffiti Alley, Spadina Avenue) Mid-January 2024 to end of April 2024

- The eastbound curb lane at Queen St W will be closed to facilitate truck access and staging.
- Piles at the south end of the site are at the property limit of Graffiti Alley. In order to maintain site safety, the Graffiti Alley is expected to be closed for the duration of this work.
- Trucks will enter on Queen St West (eastbound) and exit on Spadina Avenue (southbound).
- Flaggers will be present to ensure pedestrian safety and direct truck traffic.





### North Site - (Queen Street West, Spadina Avenue, Bulwer Street) March 2024 - June 2024

- The parking lane on the east side of Spadina Avenue (northbound) will remain closed
- Trucks will enter the site from Spadina Avenue (northbound) and will exit to Bulwer Street
- Pedestrian access north on Spadina Avenue will be maintained. Once the heritage façade retention towers are installed, a pedestrian tunnel will be provided under a scaffold.
- The sidewalk on the south side of Bulwer Street will continue to be partially closed.
- Flaggers will still be present to ensure pedestrian safety and direct truck traffic.

## **About the Ontario Line**
