

# Updated pedestrian access on Queen Street West

**Expected start date:** July 26, 2024 and July 28, 2024

**Expected duration:** Two overnight shifts

**Hours of work:** Overnight from 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m.

## What is happening?

- As construction activities for the Ontario Line station at Queen progress, crews will be reconfiguring pedestrian access during two overnight shifts as follows:
  - Overnight, starting on **July 26, 2024**, crews will reopen the south sidewalk on Queen Street West, in front of Hudson's Bay (refer to graphic).
  - Overnight, starting on **July 28, 2024**, crews will shift the existing crosswalk between the north and south sides of Queen Street West from its current location in front of the entrances to the Toronto Eaton Centre and Hudson's Bay to the east by approximately 20 metres (refer to graphic for new location of crosswalk).

## What to expect

- As of July 29, 2024, the pedestrian pathway through the work zone is expected to be realigned as outlined above.
- All other pedestrian access routes remain the same.
- To minimize impact to pedestrians, crews will complete realignment works during overnight shifts, from 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m.
- Fast fencing will be moved to new locations during this time.
- Wayfinding signages will be in place throughout the work zone to direct pedestrians in the area.
- All necessary construction permits have been obtained.

### Note:

- Work may be delayed, rescheduled, or extended due to weather conditions or unforeseen circumstances.
