

Borehole investigation work at De Grassi Street and Queen St. East.

Expected start date: As early as **April 13, 2026** for approximately one day

Hours of work: between 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

What is happening?

- To facilitate construction of the Riverside-Leslieville Station, construction crews must conduct investigative work to determine current ground conditions. This work involves drilling boreholes.
- During this work, there will be traffic control barriers delineating vehicles away from the work area on De Grassi Street.
- The investigative work will begin as early as **April 13, 2026** for approximately one day, and will be performed from **7 a.m. to 7 p.m.**
- Traffic control personnel will also be on-site to safely direct motorists and pedestrians.

What to expect

- A temporary pedestrian detour on De Grassi Street will be required to complete this work. Vehicular traffic will not be impacted.
- All work areas are temporary. All affected areas will be returned to public use following completion of the borehole drilling.
- All work areas will be delineated from the public.
- Noise from construction can be expected.
- Work may be postponed or rescheduled due to unforeseen circumstances.
