

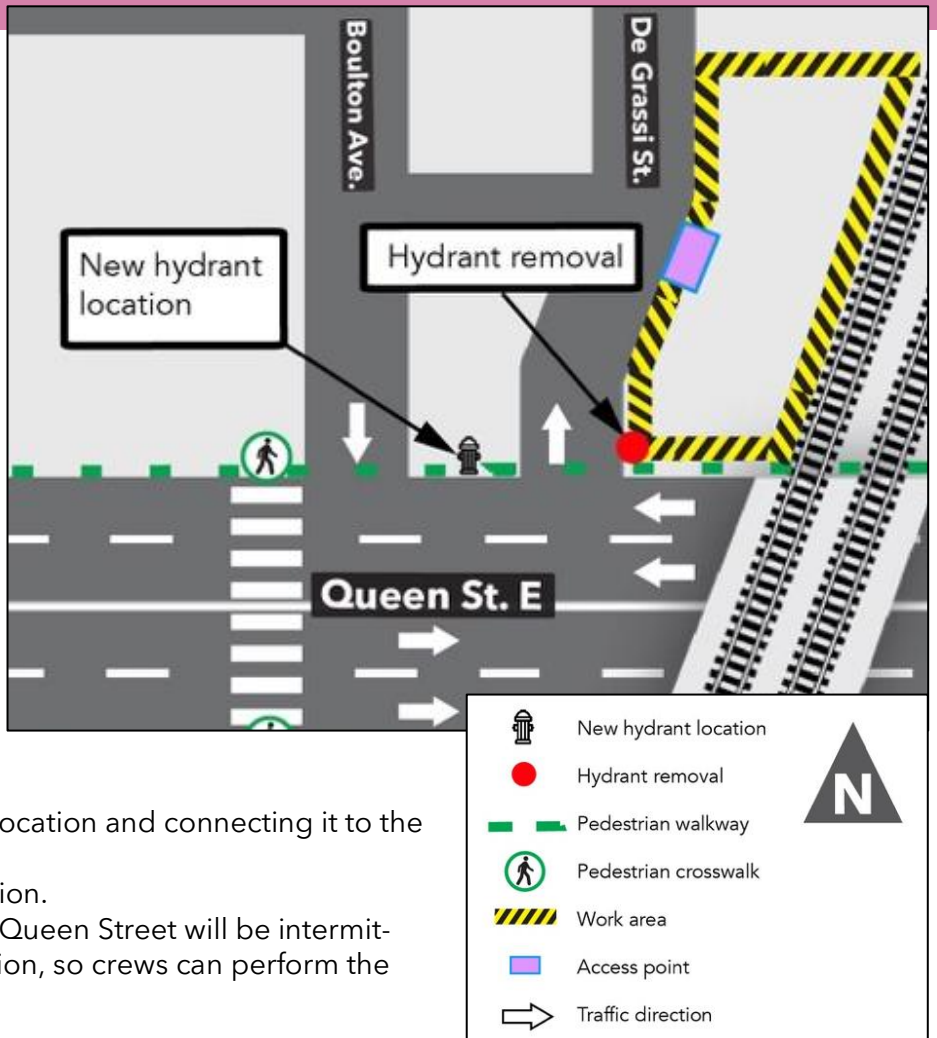
# Fire hydrant relocation at Queen Street East and De Grassi Street

**Expected start date:** As early as **May 4, 2026** for approximately 10 days

**Hours of work:** Monday to Friday, between 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

## What is happening?

- To facilitate construction of the Leslieville Station, construction crews will relocate the fire hydrant at the northeast corner of Queen St. East and De Grassi Street, to the north side of Queen Street, between Boulton Avenue and De Grassi Street.
- The relocation will begin as early as **May 4, 2026**, and work will continue for approximately 10 business days, and will be performed between **8 a.m. to 5 p.m.**
- This work will include:
  - Removing the existing fire hydrant.
  - Minor excavation at new hydrant location.
  - Installing the hydrant in new location and connecting it to the watermain.
  - Paving over the existing location.
  - The westbound curb lane on Queen Street will be intermittently closed at the new location, so crews can perform the work safely.



## What to expect

- This closure is scheduled to begin as early as **May 4, 2026** and is expected to take up to 10 days to complete.
- Fire hydrant installation will not require sidewalk restrictions.
- Noise from trucks and construction can be expected.
